German - American HISTORY 101


Today we remember Baron Friedrich Wilhelm Ludolf Gerhard Augustin von Steuben. Better known to most of us as General von Steuben, a great German-American who helped our country win the Revolutionary War. It was von Steuben,



who in the words of Alexander Hamilton, "introduced into the army a regular formation and exact discipline." General von Steuben was born in 1730 in Magdeburg, Germany as the son of an officer in the army of Frederick the Great. At the age of 16 von Steuben entered the Prussian army and displayed such outstanding ability that he soon became a member of the Prussian general staff and the title of Baron was conferred on him. He offered his services to the American colonies after the Revolution had begun. In Paris he met with Benjamin Franklin who was seeking support for American independence. He offered his services as a volunteer, requesting only a guarantee of his expenses and commissions for his two aides. He met with George Washington who was encamped at Valley Forge. On the way to Valley Forge, German-American farmers gave the Prussian general a hearty ovation and welcome as they lined along the roadsides. General Washington was impressed by von Steuben's military ability and experience, they became lifelong friends. In 1778 he wrote a book of military regulations called the Blue Book, still in use by our present day Army. After the Revolution, von Steuben constructed plans for the founding of a military academy, laying the ground work for West Point. General von Steuben wasn't just a soldier, but also well known as a gentleman and man of high culture. As a reward for his services the Congress granted him 16,000 acres of land near Utica, New York. He became the first President of The German Society of New York, a German-American organization designed to help recent immigrants in New York and still in existence today. Over the past two centuries, many monuments have been erected; one fine example is the Bronze Statue of the General that stands in Milwaukee's Washington Park. In Philadelphia, New York and Chicago, parades are held each year to serve as a tribute to the service he provided to our country.
