German - American HISTORY 191

Today we remember Ludwig Heinrich Gehrig (1903-1941) known to the rest of us as Lou Gehrig the German-American Baseball Legend. Lou Gehrig was born in the once famous German neighborhood of Yorkville in New York



City. Both of his parents were German-Lutheran immigrants and conducted their daily activities within the German enclave. His father Heinrich was a sheet metal worker and his mother Christina was a maid. Together they produced a total of four children; Lou in particular was a very large baby weighing approximately 14 pounds at birth. Sadly, two of his sisters died from whooping cough and measles at a very early age. After their passing, Lou was forced to step in and assist his mother with her work. Lou did everything imaginable to help, from folding laundry to picking up supplies from local businesses. In 1923 life would begin to take a turn for the better in the Gehrig household. Lou was invited to join the New York Yankees. Little did anyone realize that Lou would become one of the most iconic figures in American Major League Baseball, known as the "The Iron Horse". Over the course of his career, Lou set many major league records, the list is astounding, a true professional player adored by baseball fans not just in New York, but around the country. Ironically Gehrig played along side another famous German-American baseball legend, The Great Babe Ruth. Lou would play professional Baseball for a total of 17 years until his career was suddenly cut short by Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS), now commonly known in the United States as Lou Gehrig Disease. In a short period of time, the disease began to take its toll on his body, Lou became disabled and could no longer play. His life ended only two years later at the young age of 36. The country mourned his passing. Lou Gehrig will forever be remembered for his spectacular achievements in the sport of Baseball. In 1939 Gehrig was elected to the Baseball Hall of Fame. In 1969 he was voted the greatest first baseman of all time by Baseball Writer's Association and was the leading vote-getter on the Major League Baseball All-Century Team, chosen by fans in 1999. The Legend of Lou Gehrig Lives!
